The median age of British farm holders is 59, with more than 30% of holders aged 65 or above.

15% of British farm holders are women.

In 2014, the number of students studying agriculture and related areas rose by 4% in undergraduate programmes and 29% in postgraduate programmes.

In 2014/2015, 19,000 people were enrolled in agriculture and related programmes. 62% were women.



Ongoing Efforts – A Snapshot

Support New Entrants to Agriculture Sector

- Provide support to organisations like the National Federation of Young Farmers Clubs.
- Encourage industry and civil society in their efforts to enable new entrants, like the pilot scheme by the Fresh Start Land Enterprise Centre.

Encourage careers in Food & Farming

- Improve skills and training with policies like the Apprenticeship Levy.
- Work with industry partners like the National Skills Academy for Food and Drink.



Women represent 43% of the agricultural workforce in developing countries.
